If a student did not have the exact uniform they were sent home. Students showed their nationalism by singing the national anthem every day.

Some of the main things I love about my country is the weather, diversity and exciting cites. Merida is the only city in Venezuela where it snows and it's really cold.

I would definitely say that moving to a new country was hard, especially because it was my first time coming to the U.S, but it's really amazing how much diversity there is and that's a great thing because cultural diffusion happens.




Red Ribbon Week



She has wanted to be a teacher since the 3rd grade and her family has always supported her decision. She also enjoys working with older children and science.


Outside of school she likes to play with her little girls, bike, hike, and watch her favorite sports teams: the Buffalo Bills and Buffalo Sabers.



Electronic Devices

New Cell-Phone Policy

USE WHILE WORKING A new cell-phone policy was introduced to Greece Athena High School this year to help focus students attention on their academics. This policy has stated that all electronic devices should be out of sight in all classes that come with a grade. This replaces the prior stoplight policy (green classes may have phones, yellow classes had phones available at the teacher's discretion and red, no phones at all). Under the rules of this new policy, there are no green classes, except study halls, and there are heavy consequences for not obeying this policy (find out more on www.greececsd.org). This new policy is similar to the policy that had been already in place for the middle school, so freshman have had an easier transition. This has been noted by teachers, as the freshmen seem to have had a better reaction to this new policy, as they have been following it for the last three years. Sophomores and upperclassmen have had to adjust to the changes, and some have struggled. However, this new policy has had a positive effect in the school, as focus in the classrooms have been much higher this year, according to some teachers. Students have not been abusing their phone privileges like they may have in the past, and that could only reap rewards for the students.

One-To-One (Google Chromebooks)

This school year every high school student has been given access to an individual personal Google chromebook. This chromebook can be used in classes or be brought home. The chromebook is linked with the student's personal school google account, where they can access their google drive, classroom, etc. Now every student has guaranteed access to the internet and teachers know this and are taking advantage of it.



Teachers are utilizing google tools, such as google classroom, to help engage with their students outside of school. Teachers can post online homework assignments and send friendly reminders directly to their students. This has created a more friendly atmosphere and relationship between the teacher and his/her students. In the classroom, students can work on homework or class assignments digitally, like typing an English essay right in class. This has made life easier for students and teachers, as assignments and projects can all be done in one place. Teachers can provide immediate and individual feedback to students regarding their work. Directions, classwork and homework are online, which increases organization and makes things easier for all parties involved. Plus, an unexpected side effect is that paper is being saved. The one-to-one plan has increased accessibility, communication, and productivity to make school a more engaged and better place.
